Department Spotlight

Dr. Savas Ozdemir



Dr. Savas Ozdemir is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Radiology, Division of Functional and Molecular Imaging. He is Board Certified in Diagnostic Radiology, Nuclear Radiology and Cardiovascular Computed Tomography.

Dr. Ozdemir attended medical school at Uludag Universities in Bursa, Turkey followed by a Diagnostic Radiology residency program at Haydarpasa Numune Hospital in Istanbul, Turkey. Dr. Ozdemir continued his education with completion of an additional five years of radiology residency programs in the United States. He attended a one year Nuclear Medicine radiology residency program at both New York Methodist Hospital in Brooklyn, New York and the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. After completing his residency in Nuclear Medicine, Dr. Ozdemir attended Bryn Mawr Hospital in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania where he completed another three year residency program in Diagnostic Radiology.

Dr. Ozdemir joined the faculty at the University of Florida College of Medicine, Jacksonville in 1999 as an Assistant Professor of Radiology with a subspecialty interest in Nuclear Medicine. In July of 2000, Dr. Ozdemir was appointed as Chief of the Division of Nuclear Medicine and has held this title for the last 13 years. While Dr. Ozdemir's primary focus is Nuclear Medicine and PET, he also specializes in Cardiac Imaging.







SHANDS JAX ADVANCED MEDICAL IMAGING INSTITUTE

I am pleased to announce plans for the development of a training institute that will provide training for up to eight ARRT post primary certifications. The specialty areas under consideration at this point include:

- Computed Tomography
- Magnetic Resonance Imaging
- Mammography
- Bone Densitometry
- Interventional Vascular
- Cardiac Interventional
- Breast Sonography
- Quality Management

These programs will be focused providing qualified applicants with the opportunities to complete their respective clinical competency requirements. The students will be provided with a limited amount of classroom instruction to support their self-study preparation effort to successfully pass their respective certification examination in their chosen post primary specialty.

The primary objectives for this project include the following:

- Develop a pool of qualified Shands Jacksonville trained applicants for potential employment opportunities and or advancement within the department of medical imaging
 - With the goal of producing a favorable impact on employee retention and job satisfaction
- Develop a pool of multi-modality technologists
 - With the goal of producing a favorable impact on staff productivity, versatility, and staffing
 - o Radiology administrators seem to be trending toward hiring technologists that have multiple certifications.
- Expand the training opportunities for existing staff and future graduates
 - o If current employees have the willingness, desire, and commitment to pursue advanced certification training, and have a willingness to work as a multi-modality technologist, then we are going to make every effort help technologists to reach that goal.
 - Extent the training opportunities for new RT graduates
 - With the goal of producing a favorable impact on employee retention and staff satisfaction.

We are looking for technologists that would like to participate in classroom instructional activities. For those that have interest in teaching, we have developed a very attractive financial incentive/reward that will be paid for each hour of classroom instruction completed. We are also, in the process of organizing a team of committed employees that would be willing to provide assistance and input for the development of the instructional plan and schedules for each certification area. We will need a total about 6 - 8 hours over the next 3 months to ensure that we can fully implement this program in January. I would hope that the supervisors or a designee from each of the respective areas would be willing to participate.

We just received confirmation from HR department that these programs will be eligible for \$800 of tuition reimbursement for eligible employees that are 0.6 FTE and higher.

Overall, we are off and running with 3 technologists already enrolled in 3 different programs. There is still a huge amount of organizational activities that need to be completed, and with some assistance from those volunteers referenced above, we should be ready to have the program fully up and running in January. The cost of each certificate program is provided below, we are going to offer discounts to those interested in pursuing different combinations of certifications.
