EXPOSURE TO COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

A communicable disease is defined as an infection that can be transmitted from one individual to another, directly or indirectly, and poses a significant threat to the health and well-being of an individual. All suspected exposures to communicable diseases must be reported to Employee Health. A resident found to have a definite exposure may be removed from their duties. Prophylaxis and treatment will be carried out according to Employee Health Protocols. Examples of possible exposures that should be reported include:
